The Obituary Etta Louise Diggs Simms

1935-2017

Etta Louise Simms was born to the late Rommie and Bessie Reid Diggs on April 22, 1935 in Wayne County, North Carolina. Although she was the youngest daughter, she served in the capacity of counselor, advisor and extended mother to numerous sisters, brothers, nieces, nephews, in-laws, friends and colleagues for many years. In addition to her parents, the following siblings preceded her in death – Jasper, Kennon, Alfred, Edison, Cleveland, Rommie, Zorabel, Lillian, Mavis, and Mildred.

Louise was raised in Wayne County and moved to Wilson County early in her life. She graduated from Williamson Springfield High School in Lucama in 1954. Following graduation she began working for the Wilson County School System and worked as a teacher's assistant at the Lucama Elementary School until her retirement in 1996. Many of the students who attended Lucama Elementary would speak to her when out in the community and mention how influential she was in their elementary school education. After her fulltime retirement, Louise worked with the afterschool program at Lucama Elementary for a number of years.

In addition to her work in the classroom, Louise worked as a family attendant for the Carrons Funeral Home in Wilson. She began working in the funeral business in 1981 at Darden Funeral Home under the leadership of the late Charles Darden. The late Robert King took over management of King & Darden Funeral Home and Louise continued working and was named the senior family attendant under the management of Carla King Horne, current owner of Carrons. She was known at the funeral home as either Mrs. Simms or Momma Simms and was oftentimes requested by various families to serve as their family attendant. Louise thoroughly enjoyed comforting families during their times of bereavement.

Finally, Louise worked on the tobacco farm with her husband Steve during the many years when he was a sharecropper. She served as the bookkeeper, ensuring that all of the help was paid accurately and she oversaw all of the tobacco harvesting tasks at the barn. Oftentimes, Louise and her sister Mildred were known as the fastest tobacco loopers around Lucama.

For most of Louise's adult life, she was an active member of the First Missionary Baptist Church of Lucama. She sang in the choir and served as the president of the Floral Club for many years. Most recently, prior to her decline in health, she served as a nurse aide for the usher's ministry, always eager to serve with a gentle and compassionate spirit.

Louise married her soul mate, Lugenus "Steve" Simms on January 12, 1955

and together they had four children. On June 23 of 2017, Steve made his transition from his earthly journey to his heavenly reward and Louise sorely missed him. As her health began to decline, Louise was no longer physically active, but her biological and adopted children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, sisters, cousins and friends could expect routine telephone calls from her throughout the week. She was known for always beginning her telephone conversations with "Hi, how're you" and ending them with "I love you." *Janice Fleming and Pamela Deans were her caregivers while she was at home.* Many of her nieces, nephews and cousins were also supportive in providing care for her throughout the week over the last twelve months.
